Paper's title: *Cultural Complexity and Political-Economic Transformation in South Africa: The Dangers of Economic Neoliberalism*

Paper's abstract: *The Research for this paper is largely a matter of field work as well as the cooperation of the Royal House of the KhoiKhoi. The context in history of the KhoiKhoi people have largely been obliterated by the forces by both white and black supremacy. The consequence is not only political deprivation but also significant economic deprivation. This paper seeks to mend this issue and to recognize that South Africa's first nation is not a matter of obliterated history. The status of this first nation provides important economic challenges which are addressed in the latter part of this paper. The central issue is the identity and social justice claims of the first nation of South Africa. The Author of this paper is the current legal advisor to the Royal House of the KhoiKhoi. South Africa inherited a complex cultural mosaic largely conditioned by economic deprivation and racism. This paper provides the contextual background of some of the principle features of the serial regimes of racial supremacy and expropriation. However, at the heart of this historic context is the position of one of the oldest nations on Earth, and the original proprietors of southern Africa: the First Nation Khoi Khoi. What makes them distinctive is that they were the first resisters to exploitation and racial supremacy, and they maintained that struggle from the 1600's to the present day. The paper presents the context in which the Khoi were expropriated, both materially and sexually, to the extent that a sub-race of the Khoi were created with an imposed identity of "Cape Coloured". The paper traces the Khoi's political struggle, its resistance to racial supremacy, and its demand for a social-democratic dispensation. The Khoi articulated the first idea of an African peoples' organization representing all the dispossessed peoples of South Africa. They merged with the first real social-democratic movement, the Non-European Unity Movement. They also merged with a 10-Point social-democratic plan for economic justice in South Africa.*
